

Pull the thread through and insert the needle at D, bringing it back through B. Continue in this way making each stitch the same length.



Bring the thread up at A. Insert at B and bring back up





around the edge.

Take the needle through the loop stitch you just made.

This anchors the thread.

bring your needle up from the back again, so it comes out the same spot and creating a loop

Bring your needle up at A l/8" from the back about 1/8" in from the edge.

Blanket Stitch

Tip: Even when using another stitch, try using a backstitch when going around a corner to make nice, neat stitches!

Go backward and insert the needle at the end of the previous stitch (B), pulling the needle back through at the end of the next stitch (C)

Bring the needle out from the back of the fabric at A, in the middle of where two stitches will be.

Backstitch

Tip: The trick to making a running stitch look great is to keep the stitches even.

Bring the needle back up again, about 1/4" from where it went down, making a second stitch.






Chain Stitch



Bring the thread through at A. Hold the thread down with your thumb and insert the needle back into the same hole at A. Bring the needle back out at B. Keep the thread under the needle and pull the thread out, making a loop.
Repeat to make a chain.




Feather Stitch




After bringing the thread up, insert needle at D and keeping thread under needle, bring back

up at E. Repeat, going from side to side the length of your embroidery.
